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# Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) 25 Request for Proposals (RFP) Release Date: April 4, 2024 Submission Date: May 3, 2024

## I. Program Purpose

Ohio Revised Code Section 3333.303 requires the Chancellor of the Ohio Department of Higher Education (ODHE) to design a statewide system of Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) support teams to increase FAFSA completion and college access programming at public schools. The statute requires that the Chancellor divide the state into regions and assign one FAFSA support team to operate in each region ("Lead"). To address this requirement, the Ohio General Assembly appropriated \$1M in funds in Fiscal Year (FY) 25.

As required by ORC 3333.303, the Chancellor divided the state into five regions, the same territories outlined via <u>https://ohio.org/home/regions</u>. The five regions include: Northeast, Northwest, Central, Southeast, and Southwest. ODHE welcomes proposals from community-based organizations, institutions of higher education, and/or educational service centers to serve as the lead organization for each Ohio region as outlined by ORC 3333.303. Applicants must demonstrate their commitment to increasing the number of completed FAFSAs in their region with the goal of the project to provide coverage to all 88 counties.

ODHE is committed to increasing the number of high school seniors that complete the FAFSA. The class of 2022 saw 61.3% of high school seniors complete the FAFSA form. The class of 2023 saw 61.9% of high school seniors complete the FAFSA form. In addition, while data for 2024 is incomplete, as of the end of January, Federal Student Aid (FSA) shared that nationally they have roughly 3.1 million FAFSAs that have been submitted. In comparison, this time last year, over 17 million FAFSAs were submitted.

# II. Eligible Applicants

Proposals may be submitted by Ohio's community-based organizations, institutions of higher education, and/or educational service centers. Preference will be granted to applicants whose organization is in the region identified.

# **III. Anticipated Awards**

A total of \$850,000 in the fiscal year 2025 will be awarded through a single competitive review of eligible proposals. Individual institutions of higher education, community-based organizations, and/or educational service centers may apply for up to \$170,000 to assist with the project.

Selected community-based organizations, institutions of higher education, and/or educational service centers will serve as the fiscal agent for the selected region and must enter into an award agreement with ODHE to receive the funds.

# IV. Eligible Expenses

Applicants seeking funding through the FAFSA 25 grant should submit proposals for work beginning on July 1, 2024, and concluding on June 30, 2025. Applicants will identify one of five regions of the state that the applicant organization will cover (using the Ohio.org/home/regions). The selected applicant will:

- Agree to serve as the fiscal agent for the identified region for this project.
- Establish which organizations (IHEs, ESCs, and/or CBOs) will serve to create the regional FAFSA Support Team.
- Identify a Regional Coordinator to provide support and coordination for the FAFSA Support Team (see attached job description)
- Identify 10 high schools in the region where Tier One services will be provided.
  - The remaining high schools in the region will receive Tier Two services.

Expenses may be used in the following ways:

- Salary and benefits for the regional coordinator
- Programs and activities
- Marketing and distribution
- Stipends

Please note, indirect costs are allowed at up to 8% and must be documented.

## V. Project Term:

The work covered by the award will begin upon execution of the Award Agreement and continue until June 30, 2025.

## VI. Proposal Review Process and Timeline

The schedule below may be revised by ODHE due to unforeseen circumstances and any changes will be communicated to applicants.

Questions must be submitted by noon on April 26, 2024.

Responses will be posted at <u>https://highered.ohio.gov/educators/grant-resources</u> by close of business on April 26, 2024.

The Chancellor's staff will initially screen proposals for completeness and eligibility. Any deficiencies must be addressed by the applicant within a timeframe set by ODHE. While all proposals will receive consideration, submission of a complete proposal does not guarantee funding.

If the applicant is selected for an award under this RFP, ODHE will provide an award notification letter to the institution, which will include the total awarded amount. ODHE and the applicant will enter into an agreement prior to funding being disbursed.

# VII. Proposal Submission

Applicants are responsible for submission of proposals within the timeframe set by ODHE. Proposals must include the address of the organization where awarded funds may be sent. This address needs to be registered in the Ohio Pays system. Proposals must be received no later than 12:00 p.m. on May 3, 2024, and must be submitted in the following manner:

 One electronic PDF file that includes: the cover letter, executive summary, project narrative, itemized budget and budget narrative. The PDF file must be uploaded to <u>https://rfp.ohiohighered.org</u>

# VIII. Proposal Requirements

## A. Format

Proposals must be submitted in Arial 10-point font or larger, there is an exception for tables and images. Please see below for page allocations and directions for each section of the proposal. Please clearly label each of the following sections within the proposal submission. Only complete proposals will go through official scoring.

- 1. **Cover Letter (one page):** Organization(s) name(s); title of project; identify the primary institutional contact by name, title, address, phone number, and email address.
- 2. **Executive Summary (one page):** Provide a description of the project to be supported by grant funds.
- 3. **Project Narrative (one to three pages):** The project narrative should address the project Criteria in order (see section C, below).
- 4. **Budget and Budget Narrative (one page):** Provide an itemized list of expenses with the rationale for each.

BUDGET	Each selected regional partner will be eligible for up to \$170,000.00 in FY25. A portion of the funding must be used to (1) pay the regional coordinator and (2) administer events and purchase materials.
	A portion of funding may also be used to support stipends for FAFSA submission and application completion work of district staff who support these efforts outside of work hours.

Stipend must be proposed in the RFP and may or may not be approved. Stipend proposals must demonstrate how the work goes above and beyond the FAFSA submission and /or college application completion work that would already be accomplished during the school day.
Stipends cannot be used for work that occurs during the school day. Stipends may be allocated for work that occurs after school hours in the evenings or on the weekends.
Stipend amounts must be reasonable (i.e. up to \$2,000 for an individual, not to exceed \$10,000 for one high school building).

# IX. Reporting Requirements

By June 30, 2025, regional coordinators will submit a report to ODHE using the provided template.

# X. Legal Notices

The applicant understands that if its proposal is accepted by the state, the applicant shall enter into an agreement with the state governing the use of the awarded funds. The applicant agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations in the conduct of the work hereunder.

The state reserves the right to fund any proposal in full or in part, to request additional information to assist in the review process, to require new proposals from interested parties, to reject any or all proposals responding to this announcement, or to reissue the announcement if it is determined that it is in the best interest of the State of Ohio. Issuing this announcement does not bind the state to making any awards. The state reserves the right to adjust the dates for this announcement for whatever reasons are deemed appropriate. The state reserves the right to waive any non-substantive infractions made by an applicant, provided that the applicant cures such infraction upon request.

All costs incurred in preparation of a proposal shall be borne by the applicant. Proposal preparation costs are not recoverable under an award. The State of Ohio shall not contribute in any way to recovering the costs of proposal preparation.

The funding decisions are final. Applicants will be notified of the outcome of their proposal(s) at the conclusion of the review process.

The applicant understands that the information provided herein is intended solely to assist the applicant in submittal preparation. To the best of the state's knowledge, the information provided is accurate. However, the state does not warrant such accuracy, and any errors or omissions subsequently determined will not be construed as a basis for invalidating this solicitation. Interested parties bear the sole responsibility of obtaining the necessary information to submit a qualifying proposal. The state retains the right to modify or withdraw

this solicitation at any time. By submitting a proposal, applicants expressly agree to these terms.

# XI. Trade Secrets

All information submitted in response to this RFP becomes property of ODHE and is public information unless a statutory exception exists that exempts it from public release under the Ohio Public Records Act, as defined in Section 149.43 of the Ohio Revised Code: All applicants are strongly discouraged from including in a proposal any information that it considers to be a "trade secret," as that term is defined in Section 1333.61(D) of the Ohio Revised Code. The applicant asserting trade secret bears the responsibility to take formal action if necessary and defend such assertion. Otherwise, public records laws may require disclosure.

# HB 33 – Statutory Language

Sec. 3333.303. (A) As used in this section:

(1) "FAFSA" means the free application for federal student aid.

(2) "Public schools" means school districts, community schools established under Chapter 3314. of the Revised Code, and STEM schools established under Chapter 3326. of the Revised Code.

(B) The chancellor of higher education shall designate a statewide system of FAFSA support teams to support public schools with FAFSA

completion and college access programming. The chancellor shall divide the state into regions based on available resources and assign at least one FAFSA support team to operate in each region. A FAFSA support team may include existing efforts by educational service centers, colleges and universities, and community-based organizations.

(C) The chancellor shall do all of the following in administering the statewide FAFSA support system:

(1) Develop with state and local stakeholders a comprehensive, multiyear, and statewide strategy for increasing FAFSA completion in this state that coordinates the new and ongoing efforts to increase completion at the state and local level;

(2) Oversee the selection and coordination of FAFSA support teams;

(3) Provide continuous information updates to FAFSA support teams;

(4) Identify strategies that have been successful nationally to increase FAFSA completion and college access and share them with stakeholders in this state;

(5) Develop and expand partnerships with existing organizations that work to expand college access and success for the purpose of assisting high school students in this state;

(6) Partner with states that have implemented FAFSA requirements to learn best practices.

(D) Each FAFSA support team shall do all of the following:

(1) Offer FAFSA programming and training for all public schools in the team's region, including supplementing existing programs;

(2) Provide annual updates on FAFSA changes to all public schools in the team's region;

(3) Coordinate and financially support FAFSA and college application completion events for public schools in the team's region;

(4) Contribute to the marketing of local FAFSA and college access events;

(5) Analyze FAFSA data and report the results of that data to the chancellor;

(6) Partner with local institutions of higher education to expand current strategies and services to public schools in the team's region;

(7) Commit to participate in professional development regarding any updated FAFSA requirements;

(8) Develop new strategies to increase FAFSA completion rates based on the team's knowledge and experiences.

## Position Summary:

The Ohio General Assembly appropriated funds in FY25 towards FAFSA support teams to support public schools with FAFSA completion and college access programming via Section 3333.303 of the Ohio Revised Code. As required by law, ODHE has identified the five regions and a community-based organization (CBO) to serve as the fiscal agent for each region. The CBO will contract with a Regional Coordinator with the following functions. The Regional Coordinator's role is to coordinate the region's FAFSA support team, which consists of the following entities: K-12 school districts (districts), institutions of higher education (IHEs), CBOs, Education Service Centers (ESCs), and the Ohio Department of Higher Education (ODHE). The Regional Coordinator will help recruit the team members of the region and organize the convening of the FAFSA support team. Furthermore, five high schools will be identified for each region. In addition, the Regional Coordinator will distribute materials to the high schools in the region to help increase FAFSA completion. The Regional Coordinator will serve as an ODHE contact for the region and will meet with the agency on a regular basis. The Regional Coordinator will work with volunteers and stakeholders as well in efforts to increase the region's FAFSA completion numbers.

## **Essential Functions:**

- The Regional Coordinator will work with the CBO and ODHE to identify and recruit the team
  members and to regularly convene the FAFSA support team. The FAFSA support team will
  identify and discuss strategies to help increase FAFSA completion in their respective region.
  ODHE will also convene the Regional Coordinators on a periodic basis to discuss the status of
  the work.
- The Regional Coordinator will work with the CBO and ODHE to identify 10 schools in their region. Once the five high schools have been chosen and have agreed to be a part of the project, the Regional Coordinator will work with and visit the high schools.
- There are two challenges that need to be completed and championed at each of the five high schools:
  - 1. Increase the students' completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
    - The Regional Coordinator will meet with students individually on completing the FAFSA.
    - The Regional Coordinator will plan and host in conjunction with the district a FASFA completion event, which can also include workshops regarding the FAFSA and financial aid opportunities for students
    - Every student is contacted and asked to either complete the FAFSA or have a guardian sign a waiver declining to complete the FAFSA.
  - 2. Plan and hold a Decision Day
    - This is a celebratory event held at the end of the school year.
    - Students are recognized and celebrated for the choice they make regarding their post-high school plans.
    - ODHE can provide guidance and ideas for the event.

- In addition to working with the ten identified school districts, the Regional Coordinator will serve the high schools in the region (including the 10 schools) via the following ways:
  - Work with the high schools in the region to register for ODHE's 3 To Get Ready, 4 To Go!!! Campaign. The campaign provides trinkets to the high schools to distribute to students if they complete a FAFSA and/or apply to a postsecondary entity.
  - Provide high schools with scholarship and postsecondary resources to pass along to students.
  - > Encourage schools to host financial aid and postsecondary application events.
  - Track all services by accurately entering demographic information, contacts, and notes. Adhere to strict confidentiality in student record keeping.
  - Refer students to other services, such as school counselors, school staff, college departments, and other agencies for assistance in areas outside of the GEAR UP site's responsibilities if deemed necessary.
- The Regional Coordinator will attend all necessary trainings, specifically related to a line-by-line training on completing the FAFSA in order to assist students in completing the FAFSA.
- Perform other duties as assigned, specifically related to the CBO's policies and procedures.

## **QUALIFICATIONS**

The Regional Coordinator must have a bachelor's degree, experience working with adolescents, and strong communication and interpersonal skills. Teaching certificate and/or experience a plus. Must be able to work autonomously and in a team environment with a collaborative focus. Must be comfortable using a laptop computer, familiar with use of the Internet as well as Microsoft Office (Word, Excel, Outlook), and must be able to enter data in a student database/tracker. Must be willing to work occasional evening and weekend hours. Must be able to provide own transportation to multiple locations. Must be able to carry up to 10 pounds daily, consisting of a laptop computer, printer, and other advising materials.

# **Tiered Services Explained**

Tier 1 services are to be provided to the selected 10 high schools and include the administration of a "Universal FAFSA" plan and the coordination of events.

# a. Universal FAFSA

- a. Participating schools agree to campaign for universal FAFSA completion in the academic year they are participating.
- b. Every student is contacted and asked to either:
  - i. Complete the FAFSA, or
  - ii. Have a guardian sign a waiver declining to complete the FAFSA.
- c. This functions as a non-mandate version of universal FAFSA to test the policy in an environment that is low risk with high school "buy in" already secure.

## b. Events

- a. 3 To Get Ready, 4 To Go!!! Campaign Register for trinkets, host an event.
- b. #WhyApply Day Friday, Sept 22, kicks off application completion campaign
- c. Decision Day Celebratory event, held at the end of the school year.
- d. FAFSA Completion event(s) An in-person completion event

Tier 2 services include the distribution of materials to remaining high schools in the region while also inviting students in the region to participate in selected programs offered at tier 1 locations.

# **Budget and Budget Narrative:**

Applicants must provide an itemized list of expenses and include the rationale for each. Please note:

- The amounts for each budget line activity must be documented and justified in the budget narrative.
- The narrative should include an estimate as to the timing of expenditures in relation to the project plan. The budget/timeline should cover the time frame of July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025.

- Explanation of how the program's costs were calculated.

Each selected regional partner will be eligible for up to \$170,000.00 in FY25. A portion of the funding must be used to (1) pay the regional coordinator and (2) administer events and purchase materials.

A portion of funding may also be used to support stipends for FAFSA submission and application completion work of district staff who support these efforts outside of work hours.

Stipend must be proposed in the RFP and may or may not be approved. Stipend proposals must demonstrate how the work goes above and beyond the FAFSA submission and /or college application completion work that would already be accomplished during the school day.

Stipends cannot be used for work that occurs during the school day. Stipends may be allocated for work that occurs after school hours in the evenings or on the weekends.

Stipend amounts must be reasonable (i.e. up to \$2,000 for an individual, not to exceed \$10,000 for one high school building).
